## Fees and Fines Reporting – Proviso 89.85 Fiscal Year 2012

Clemson University Education and General Fines and Fees Report Fiscal Year 2012

Proviso 89.85 of the FY 2012-13 State of South Carolina Appropriation Act requires a reporting of aggregate fines and fees charged and collected in the prior fiscal year.

Fees and charges are classified in three general groups, Regulatory Established Fees, Board of Trustee Approved fees and Other Fees.

## Regulatory Established Fees

Clemson University operates a Municipal Court. Municipal Court fines and fees are established in the SC Code of Laws Title 14. Assessments related to the fines are required to be remitted to the State Treasurer's Office. An annual audit of the Schedule of Municipal Court Fines /Assessments and Remittance is required to be sent to the State Treasurer's Office and filled with the office of the State Auditor. Clemson University collects a fee of \$30 for checks returned by the bank. In FY 2012, \$11,863 was collected in returned checks fee charges. SC Code of Laws Title 34, Chapter 11, Section 70 authorizes a charge for a returned checks. Revenues collected for the returned check charge is used to support collection costs for returned checks.

### **Board of Trustee Approved Fees**

Clemson University derives authority to assess fees in accordance with the South Carolina Code of Laws, Title 59, Chapters 101, 112, 135. Student fees are approved by the Board of Trustees as part of the Budget approval process. (See Attachment 1). ### Other Fees

Other fees and charges are approved in the annual billing rate process. Under the billing rate policy, fee request are reviewed and approved by the University Administrative Council. These charges are posted on the University website at - http://www.clemson.edu/cfo/comptroller/rates/billingrates/1112/index.html.

Fees collected and other revenues are provided in the Statement of Unrestricted Current Revenues (See Attachment 2).

## FY 2012-13 Appropriation Act

89.85. (GP: Fines and Fees Report) In order to promote accountability and transparency, each state agency must provide and release to the public via the agency's website, a report of all aggregate amounts of fines and fees that were charged and collected by that state agency in the prior fiscal year. The report shall include, but not be limited to: (1) the code section, regulation, or proviso that authorized the fines and fees to be charged, collected, or received; (2) the amount received by source; (3) the purpose for which the funds were expended by the agency; (4) the amount of funds transferred to the general fund, if applicable, and the authority by which the transfer took place; and (5) the amount of funds transferred to another entity, if applicable, and the authority by which the transfer took place, as well as the name of the entity to which the funds were transferred. The report must be posted online by September first. Additionally, the report must be delivered to the Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee by September first. Funds appropriated to and/or authorized for use by each state agency shall be used to accomplish this directive.
